AAG Presidents Message

Last month at the general meeting I referenced "If Everybody Did It", a new book written by Marcia Losh and illustrated by Phyllis Arnold. Essentially, the book invites you to consider the consequence of choice and the influence, impact, and effect one



person's choice has on others – not only on their individual lives, but on their community and the earth as well. It is a beautiful story written for children with a moral for all. We know so well how one choice can change the path of many.

In light of current political and social climate I have been thinking about the choices we make and more specifically the choices we make as artists. As artists, we face a multitude of choices as we determine the course of our current project – from composition, materials, color, placement of color or texture, design, perspective and so on. As artists the choices we make in and out of the studio are driven by our creativity, our curiosity, and our personal experiences or perspective. Perhaps it is because we study perspective that we are able to view situations from several vantages points. When not bogged down by our own 'stuff' obscuring our view, we are generally open to different points of view. Living outside the box we approach the world from a creative perch.

With choice comes voice. What is the voice of your art? For instance, if you are a landscape painter, are you creating pretty images of the natural world? Or do you remind people of the fragility or conversely the mighty power of that same world? Or do you transport people from their world into the one you created in your painting, stirring introspection and personal reflection?

As artists, living a creative life, we use our choices to determine the voice of our work. What is your artistic voice? If your focus is about mastery of a medium, technique, or skill – that's ok. If its about having fun – that's ok, too. If you have not considered the meaning behind your work, consider this an invitation to do so. I pose this question to myself in my work in and out of my studio and particularly in my leadership position as president of AAG.

We have a great month ahead. Be sure to read the newsletter and check the website for details. Don't miss the general meeting this month, Tessa Windt will be leading an interactive program on Feb 21 that is sure to be inspirational and thought provoking focusing on the arts and aging. Rodger LeBrash will open his blacksmithing studio to the sculptor's group on February 6. 15 Veterans each month, learn how to be an artist.





An Artistic Journey by Glenda Folk

The first time, I submitted work to Watercolor West in 1997; I was surprised to learn that one of my paintings was selected. The exhibit was juried by Robert Woods, a well-known California artist. At that time, I was already teaching full time as the Advanced Placement, Studio Art and Art History educator at Central High School, and still participating, as the director and choreographer for my private enterprise, Arizona Dance Theatre.

Presently, as a partially retired visual arts and performing arts educator, I began submitting work for exhibitions, again. My second submission to Watercolor West was rejected in 2013, however, my third and fourth tries were successful and I exhibited in 2015 and 2016, in the 47th and 48th Watercolor West International exhibits. Many artists have told me that they have tried annually and were selected only once, so I feel honored to have become a Signature member. Artists can never take anything for granted and must always work hard, in developing artistic ideas that result in creating meaningful work. Artists are vulnerable in so many ways and need to remain vigilant, in order to survive in this highly competitive field of cultural production. I've learned some hard lessons along the way such as, being too busy to read a prospectus, carefully, and that experience cost me an important exhibit. It's disappointing to be rejected after being accepted, but I had to pay the price for my mistake. We must never become discouraged. Humans do make careless mistakes, sometimes, but it still hurts. Art is not an easy road, and we need to be aware of different viewpoints and rules, in the selection process for different organizations.

Mostly, local organizations cater to mainstream audiences, and that can cause conflicts within an artist, due to their educational, cultural, or social-political backgrounds. At graduate levels, in university setting, technical knowledge is assumed to be in place, and the focus turns to meaningful ideas, which may actually be threatening to mainstream organizations, jurors and audiences. Because of my performing arts background, my graduate exhibit and subject matter, remains on exploring women's issues related to social justice and equity in the entertainment industry. I find the subject fascinating and it continues to be important in my art production. However, this is a hard sell in many artistic venues, and I have to constantly seek out subjects that may appeal to mainstream audiences. I often become exhausted from trying so hard, but I do not want to give up something so important to me, personally. Most of all, I find the journey extremely exhilarating and satisfying. I plan to continue, as long as I can communicate ideas, read write and move.

SCULPTING EQUIPMENT FOR SALE

I have a adjustable (crank up style) heavy duty professional sculpting work stand. It is like the ones you use at Scottsdale Artists School. I need to get \$350 for it and they sell new for \$600 plus shipping. It is like new and I can deliver it too. I also have one that does not crank up but it is still adjustable, and that would be around \$125 but whichever one sells first I will keep the other one.

I also have a 24" Tru-Form armature with the base that has the foam body parts to help you get started. This would be for oil based clay and to make a mold. They sell new for \$100 plus shipping, I am asking \$75.00 and it is brand new and assembled.
